Which exam board and courses are studied at A Level?

Edexcel A.

What skills will studying Economics equip me with?

Analytical and evaluation skills, essay writing skills, knowledge of a real world, relevant subject.

Do I need a specific grade at GCSE to access A level?

6 in Mathematics and a 6 in English Literature or English language.

How is the course structured and how will it be taught?

Economics is taught in two distinct strands – Microeconomics and Macroeconomics.

Is there a coursework component?

No.

How is the course resourced?

You will get course notes and the option to purchase a revision guide.

How well do students achieve in Economics?

Students achieve very good results in Economics.

What are typical A level subject choices alongside Economics?

Mathematics, Law and Business.

Do I need to take another subject to support my study of Economics?

Mathematics complements Economics well but no specific other A levels are a requirement.

Other helpful information about studying Economics

Economics is split into two distinct strands – Microeconomics and Macroeconomics:-

- Microeconomics is the study of individual markets and how they allocate goods and services.
- Macroeconomics is the study of the economy both nationally and globally.
