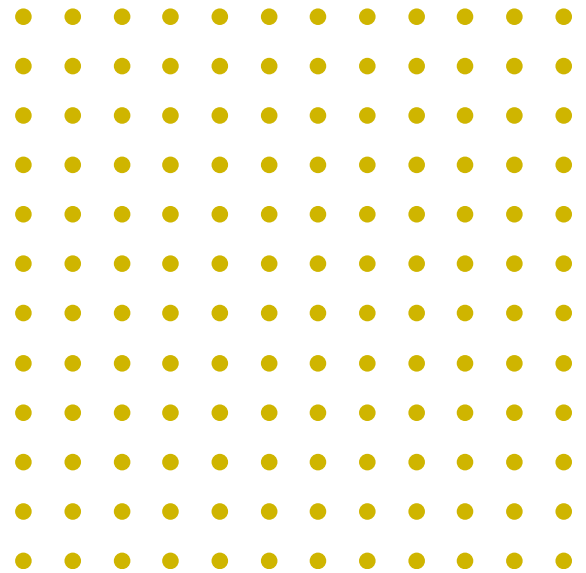

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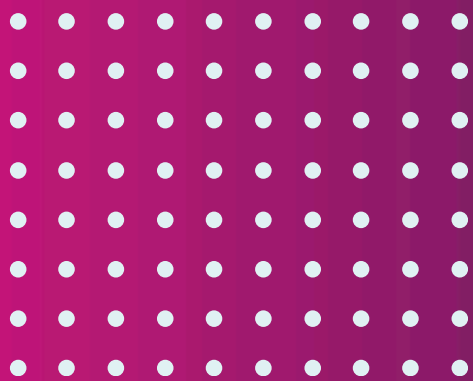
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Foreword

Following the successful introduction of co-educational learning at Wirral Grammar School for Boys, we are delighted to announce that from September 2026 our Sixth Form will be open to both female and male students from all schools. Our admissions policy at post-16 is as follows:

Each year the school welcomes a number of students from other schools. Places are offered after a visit to the school by a prospective student and their parent/carer and meeting with the Sixth Form Team. There is no limit upon entry provided admissions do not prejudice efficient education.

As a guide, students typically enter the Sixth Form with a minimum of 6 GCSE Grades at 9-5, or their equivalent, including English and Mathematics. Our prime concern is for students to embark on courses that are appropriate for their ability. A Grade 6 or 7 is considered a solid starting point to continue a subject to A level. All requests for admission to Sixth Form are considered on an individual basis.

Students are expected to commit to the wider opportunities for enrichment, student leadership, challenge and the broader ethos of the school. As senior role models, WGS6 students are expected to set a positive example to younger students in terms of standards of behaviour, attendance & punctuality.

All WGS6 students study three A-levels and a number undertake an additional EPQ Qualification.

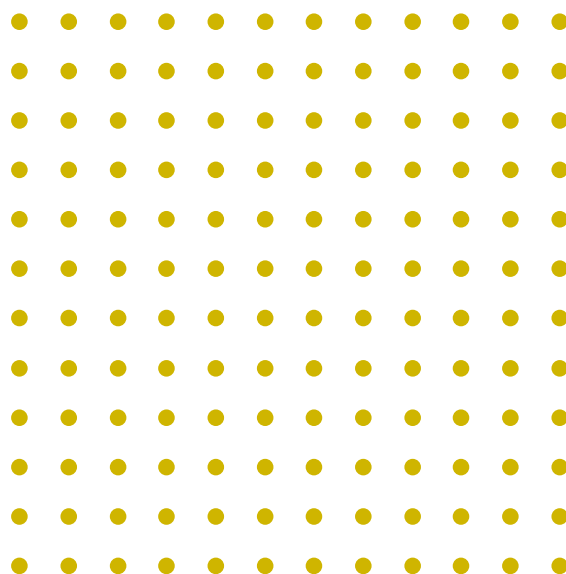

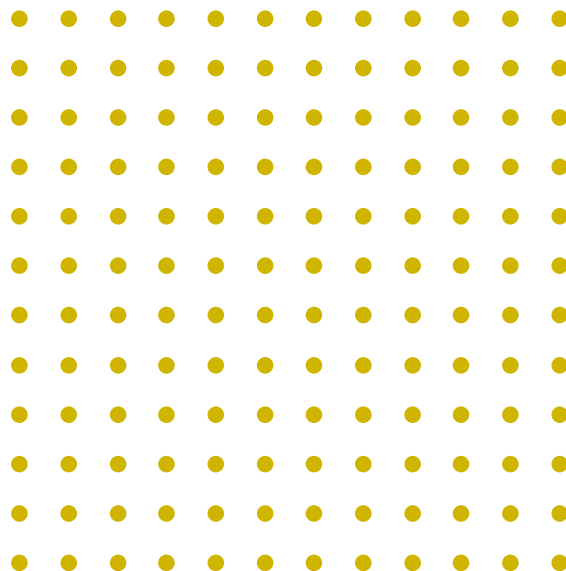

In Years 12 and 13, students benefit from structured careers education alongside individual support. All students have access to one-to-one guidance interviews to discuss aspirations, university choices, apprenticeships and career planning. These conversations help students identify suitable pathways and understand the steps needed to achieve their goals.

At WGS6, our careers programme is ambitious, personalised and focused on success.



Students benefit from:

- UCAS** and **personal statement** support
- Preparation for **Oxbridge, Medicine** and other **competitive courses**
- Higher and degree **apprenticeship support** programme

Our careers programme is designed to equip students with the knowledge, confidence and skills to make informed decisions about their future pathways. For university, degree apprenticeships, employment, or alternate routes, we support every ambition.



Year 12 students begin exploring post-18 options early, attending higher education fairs, apprenticeship events and employer presentations. They are introduced to the UCAS process and supported in researching courses and institutions/companies that match their interests and strengths.

In Year 13, support becomes increasingly personalised, with focused sessions on completing applications, preparing for interviews, and meeting key deadlines. Students applying for Apprenticeships, Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary science, or Oxbridge receive additional specialist preparation.



Our careers programme complements the academic rigour of Sixth Form study by helping students to recognise and articulate the transferable skills they develop through leadership roles, enrichment activities and wider participation in school life.

Students leave WGS6 as confident, well-informed young adults, equipped not only with excellent academic qualifications but also with a clear sense of direction and the skills needed to succeed in higher education, apprenticeships and their chosen careers.

DEVELOPING POTENTIAL

WGS6 is dedicated to developing student potential. This commitment goes beyond a student's academic attainment, supporting students to become valued, positive and inspiring members of their community, both in school and beyond.

Students enjoy a wealth of high-quality opportunities that reflect leaders' aim 'to develop each individual's potential to the full'. These include volunteering in the community and supporting pupils at local primary schools. For example, they coordinate a peer support group for younger pupils.

Activities students participate in include:

FITNESS & TEAMWORK

Sport at WGS6 is a central part of Sixth Form life, offering students the opportunity to compete, lead and excel across rugby and hockey in the winter and cricket in the summer. Students benefit from a structured and high-performance sporting programme that runs alongside academic study. Regular fixtures take place throughout the week and on Saturdays, allowing Sixth Form students to represent the school in competitive local, regional and national competitions while developing teamwork, resilience and leadership skills. Teams consistently compete in the highest end of school sport against leading grammar and independent schools, with a full calendar of fixtures and tournaments demonstrating both depth and quality across year groups. The school's commitment to sport is reflected in the breadth of opportunities available, from elite-level competition to inclusive participation, with many students continuing their sporting journeys at university and club level.



Sporting enrichment is further enhanced through international experiences, which have become a hallmark of the Sixth Form programme. In July 2025 our senior rugby and hockey players toured South Africa which provided students with the chance to compete against international opposition while experiencing different sporting cultures. In 2026 our cricket teams visited Barbados. These trips, alongside regular fixtures and tournaments, ensure that students gain a truly broad and memorable sporting education, combining performance with personal development and global perspective.

Rugby

Rugby has achieved notable success on the national stage in recent years with recent leavers Tom Roebuck and Dylan Hodkinson pursuing professional careers with Sale Sharks, with Tom going on to achieve notable success with England. Since 2012 the school has reached the semi-final or final of the prestigious RFU National Schools Competition on 5 occasions including the 2026 victory in the National Schools U15 Vase. Our 1st XI have been North West runners up for the last 2 years. We regularly progress to regional level in indoor format.

Cricket

WGS6 has strengthened its cricket fixtures list in recent years. The school boasts indoor facilities amongst the best locally, including 4 cricket lanes and 2 bowling machines to allow students to work on developing and improving their game. The senior 1st and 2nd XI currently both enter the National T20 Competition, as well as the U17 Cricket Paper Competitions where we progressed to the semi-final in 2025.



Basketball is a growing sport. We have a WGS6 team that competes in the Dynamik Schools U19 Basketball competition as well as an expanding fixture list. The basketball environment is inclusive and offers internal games and a platform for those that enjoy the sport and simply want to enjoy playing and improve along the way.

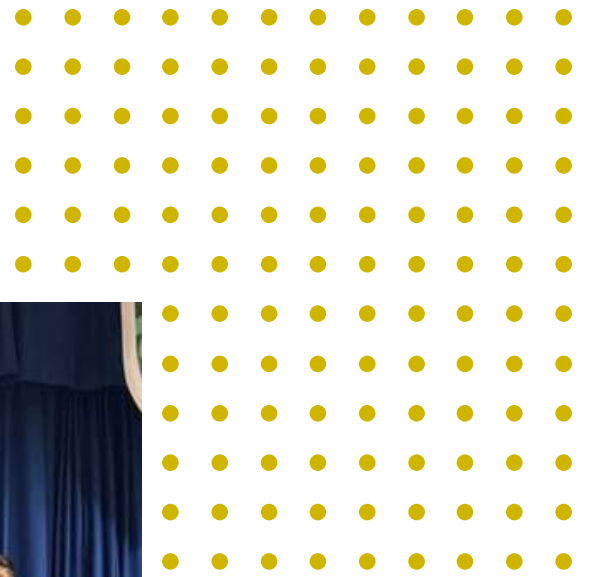

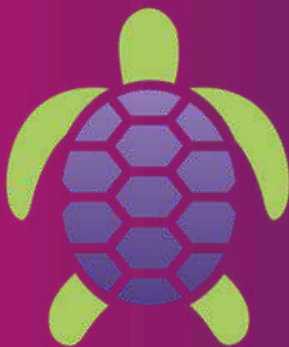
Mental Health & Wellbeing

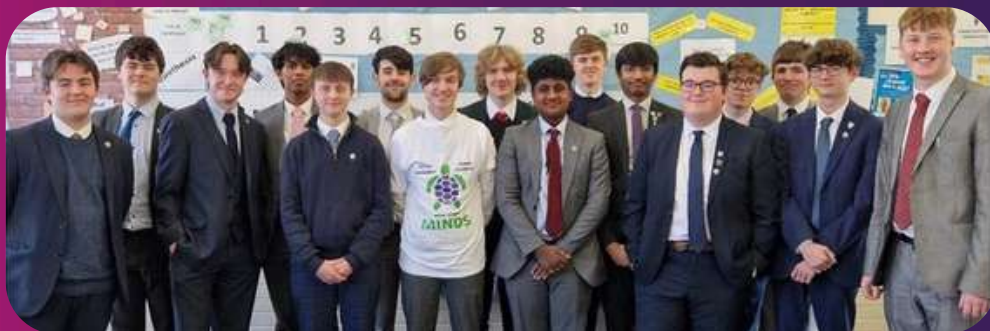

EXPLORING THE WORLD

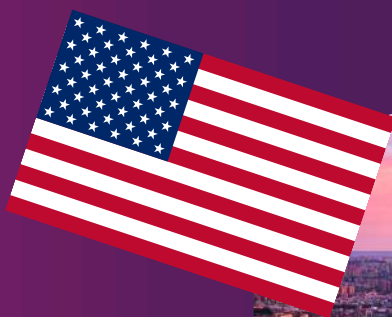

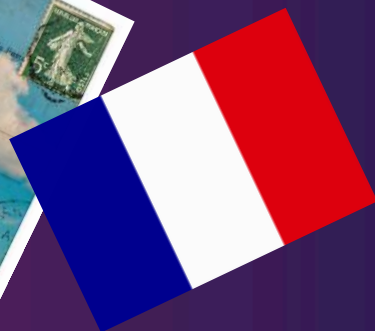


New York

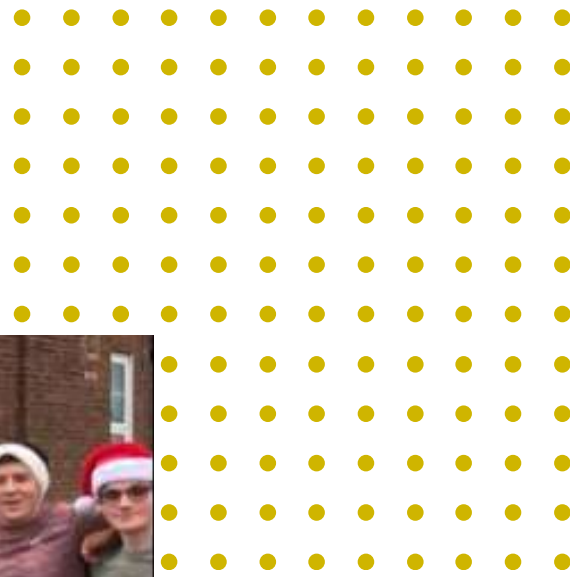


EXCITING CHANGES

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Biology



Biology is a popular A Level and allows for direct entry to undergraduate courses relating to the increasingly important Biological Sciences. Not only does this course allow entry to prestigious universities, but it also teaches skills of data analysis, mathematical and statistical methods, presenting and organising information and an ability to challenge concepts. Many universities demand A-level Biology for entry to the following areas:

Medicine, Veterinary Science, Biochemistry Pharmacology, Genetics, Microbiology, Dentistry, Biotechnology, Physiotherapy and Marine Biology.

Careers in Education, Psychology, Food, Health, Business and Environmental Management will all require skills and knowledge that can be gained from this course. In an ever-changing world, where gene technology and environmental change begin to impact on our everyday lives, a full understanding of these important principles becomes increasingly valuable.

Business



This course will provide an excellent foundation for further study of Business and Management in Higher Education. Course content, with its strong empirical bias, will provide a useful background for any candidate wishing to pursue a career in business. At the last count there were over 1800 Business or Business related courses offered at UK universities.

As part of the course we offer talks from local business owners and an A Level Business Conference in Manchester. This provides students with the opportunity to see ideas being put into practice. Finally, given the quantitative nature of the course, coupled with the requirement to write detailed essays, it is essential that pupils attain a minimum Grade 5 in either English Language or Literature and a minimum Grade 5 in Mathematics.

Chemistry



The course covers the three key areas of Chemistry: physical, organic and inorganic. Chemistry is a practical subject however there is no coursework, instead this content will be assessed and graded through written examinations only. This can only be successful if a student has the opportunity to use apparatus and develop the techniques as specified in the specification. To this end, practical work will remain at the heart of what we do. At the end of the two-year course students will receive a separate endorsement of their practical skills, taken alongside their A Level exams.

The AQA specification is designed to follow on from the AQA Combined Science GCSE and will develop a candidate's knowledge and understanding to provide a pathway to further study. Students will rediscover many familiar topics during the first year such as atomic structure, bonding, alkanes and mole calculations. This knowledge and understanding is extended and many new topics such as periodicity, aldehydes and ketones are also introduced.

Computer Science



This course focuses on both the theoretical and practical elements of Computer Science, providing students who wish to pursue a higher education course or career in this field with a secure understanding of all aspects of Computing. Students will also focus on code analysis and skeleton programs learning how these programs work and have been constructed.

The aim of this course is to provide students with a thorough understanding of all aspects of Computer Science to help them prepare for the future. It will provide them with excellent skills and knowledge to apply across all aspects of life in this digital age, as well as providing a taster to allow them to consider which pathway of Computer Science they would potentially like to study further.

Subject Content:

Fundamentals of programming, data structures, algorithms, data representation, computer systems, computer organisation and architecture, communication and networking, databases and functional programming.

Theory of computation, Consequences of uses of computing, Big data, Systematic approach to problem solving and Non-examined assessment.

Design Technology



This creative qualification gives students the practical skills, theoretical knowledge and confidence to succeed in a number of careers, especially those in the creative industries. They will investigate historical, social, cultural, environmental and economic influences on design and technology, whilst enjoying opportunities to put their learning in to practice by producing products of their choice. Students will gain a real understanding of what it means to be a designer, alongside the knowledge and skills sought by higher education and employers.

The course provides an opportunity for students to involve themselves in practical problem-solving activities and relate knowledge and skills to that activity. This course is available to all students, whether they have studied GCSE Design and Technology or not. It requires an interest in designing and making and how things work in general. Students will be expected to look at design within the real world and, as part of their project, will identify and solve problems taken from situations identified by them.

Design and Technology offers a broad and balanced approach to advanced design studies with special attention given to 'hands on' experience across a wide range of design and technological activities. The course encourages innovation and considers the varied interests of students, enabling them to learn about design in a make, test and evaluate context.

Economics



The broad and multi-disciplinary nature of Economics, and its application to a wide range of current economic issues, calls upon students to demonstrate the transferability of their knowledge, understanding and skills. Economics is an ideal vehicle to assist candidates in developing knowledge and understanding of key economic awareness and its application. Each module includes opportunities to develop all key skill areas, both 'hard' and 'soft'. At the last count, there were over 1,500 Economics or Economics related degree courses being offered at University.

The course will provide an excellent foundation for further study of Economics or Business and Management in Higher Education. Material used, having a strong empirical bias, will provide a useful background for any candidate wishing to pursue a career in business and finance. Visits offered by the department include field trips to Lancaster University Management School, an A-level Economics Conference and a chance to enter the Young Economist of the Year competition; the latter being an opportunity for students to see ideas being put into practice.

English Language



Language is woven into every aspect of our lives. You may be woken up by the voice of the news presenter and listen to the headline about Elon Musk's latest take over. You move to the shower and 'cosy-chatty-witty' label on your shampoo bottle catches your eye. On the way to school, you notice the sign in your favourite coffee shop and wonder when words like 'frappuccino' and 'babyccino' were first invented. *Why not become a linguist and decode and explore language?*

Course overview:

- Language and the individual: exploring meaning and representations behind a range of different texts. Decipher why journalists, advertisers, PMs use the language that they do to manipulate their audience.
- Language varieties: exploring the effect on language of gender, accent, occupation, power, ethnicity. Ever wondered how serial killers use language to gain power in conversations? Join us to decode and decipher the power of language.
- Child language acquisition: study the development of children's speech and language. This is a great way to understand the root of learning language; great for aspiring teachers.
- Language change and diversity: the study of how time and different factors such as technology and colonialism have affected the English Language. Ever wondered why language has changed so drastically from the Shakespearean age to the 21st century?

English Literature



Literature is a valuable foundation for any degree or career requiring excellent written communication, research, and analytical skills. It brings history to life and engages with ideas and concepts that are central to human life and experience. You will learn how to express informed and independent opinions and gain insight into key literary influences on our culture and society.

Studying Literature widens your appreciation of literature and develops independent and critical thinking. You will be able to analyse sophisticated ideas and how they are presented and will develop the ability to build convincing arguments to develop an effective formal communication style.

The course is split into 3 parts: Y12: 'Elements of Crime' explores themes of guilt, remorse, retribution, and violence. We read poetry about crime and criminals, including work by Wilde, Crabbe, and Browning. Novels include Brighton Rock, a classic story of gang warfare in the dark underworld of Brighton, and When Will There Be Good News, a gripping and atmospheric detective thriller.

We also begin the NEA Theory and Independence, which allows you to choose your own texts for study. We explore different ways of reading including narrative theory, post-colonialism, Marxism, feminism, and eco-criticism.

Fine Art



Following the first skills-based foundation stage of the course, students will choose the direction of their forward study. Teacher input will be individual and bespoke from this point. Digital art, Film, Painting, Sculpture, Mixed-media drawing, Photography, and 3-Dimensional construction are areas of specialism that enjoy success. Students may also choose to pursue more 'issue based' artwork. In addition, there is a requirement for a written component dealing with the exploration of historical and contemporary references, involving first-hand investigation through visits to Art Galleries and Museums (2000–3000 words).

Candidates will focus on the ongoing development of personal ideas, concepts, and techniques, and will be evidenced throughout (usually, but not exclusively, in the form of sketchbooks). The iterative process of problem solving is encouraged and results in higher-grade awards.

The power of the knowledge economy, the UK's employment targets around the Creative Industries and the Europe's assertion that it will be the world leader in creative thinking by the mid part of the next decade, means that the study of art is becoming more widely recognised as the ideal complementary subject link. Due to the academic rigour and the degree of self-directed learning necessary for successful completion of this A Level, it makes it a valuable contribution to university offers and subsequent career paths, even outside of the Creative Industries.

French is a world language. It is the official language in 33 countries and, other than English, is the only language spoken as a native language in all 5 continents. The Russell Group of universities ranks French as a preferred A-Level and the ratio of applicants to places across modern languages is better for the applicant than any other subject area. Geology



Geology is, above all, a problem-solving science subject and involves the study of the processes that have formed and continue to shape planet Earth. It is important to know how our planet works in order to manage its resources effectively and to cope with the hazards and changes that are happening to the Earth around us. There has never been a more interesting time to be involved in the science that studies the Earth!

You will study a range of topics concerning the Earth, including its internal structure, how the Earth's plates move and how these movements cause hazards for us. You will learn about the clues contained in igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic rocks that allow us to work out how they formed. In addition, you will study fossils which reveal the development of life on Earth, how the Earth provides geological resources essential for engineering and technology, and evidence for previous times of climate change on Earth (and how this can help us in the future).

Fieldwork and practical investigation are essential in Geology. You will go on a number of field trips, visiting places where rocks can be easily seen at the Earth's surface. Here you will collect information on your field trips that will allow you to work out what the Earth was like millions of years ago. Geology should be accessible to all and we will endeavour to accommodate mobility requirements for fieldwork.

History



Our team of subject specialists support students in attaining the very best results through the study of stimulating and thought-provoking courses: British History, 1851-1964 and the Cold War, 1945-1991. The former traces the roots of Britain today, in terms of politics, the economy, society, social policy and relations with Ireland. The latter studies the relationship between international communism and capitalism over the period and involves the study of major events such as the Cuban Missile Crisis, the Arms Race and war in Afghanistan. In addition, students carry out a piece of independent research in their coursework, which constitutes 20% of their examination total.

We support students through the use of course materials, a well-stocked departmental library, live marking, guidance sheets and membership of the Historical Association. We can offer the reassurance of a track record of success in terms of grades with 40% of students over the last six years attaining grade A or A*, 90% grade B or above and 94% grade C or above.

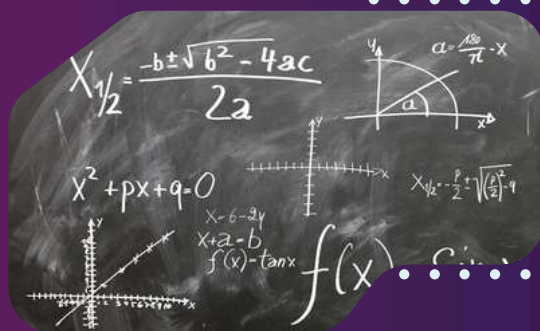

Music



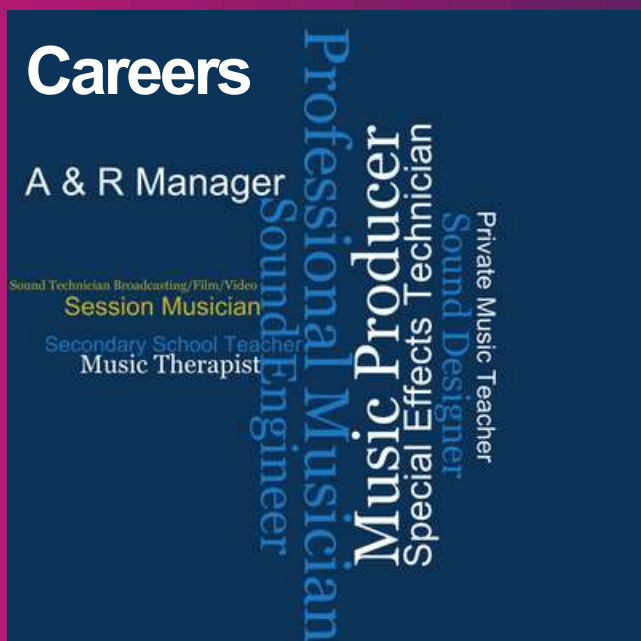

This qualification is linear which means that students will sit all of their written examinations and submit their non-exam assessment at the end of the two-year course.

Physics



Physics A level builds on GCSE topics and considers the big questions like “How did the universe begin?”, “What are the basic building blocks of matter?” and “How does the Sun keep on shining?” Physics also enables students to express their mathematical understanding of concepts such as forces, cosmology and quantum theory. Students develop skills in areas such as problem-solving, reasoning, numeracy, ICT and communication.

Year 1 topics develop many aspects of the subject introduced at GCSE. These topics consider essential ideas such as: the motion of objects using Newton’s Laws; how forces act; current, voltage and resistance in electrical circuits; and how materials respond to forces. The final topic considers how physical models, in this case, for the nature of light, have developed due to new evidence.

In Year 2, students develop a greater understanding of physical concepts and scenarios. Students will study the motion of objects by learning about motion in a circle and periodic motions, such as those of springs or pendulums. Ideas about electric circuits are extended to include capacitors and induction of an e.m.f. The structure of the atom, especially the nucleus, is studied with reference to fundamental particles and the energy available from nuclear reactions. This leads us to consider how stars form and develop within a wider study of the Universe.

Politics



The study of Government and Politics A-Level is designed to build an interest in how the processes of politics and government work and to create a deeper understanding of the nature of political issues and exchange in the UK. The discipline is interesting, demanding and rewarding. Political ideas will be examined in depth to gain an understanding of the role of ideology in politics and a comparative study will provide a fascinating insight into US politics.

An active interest in current political issues and ideas is vital, as is an enthusiasm to contribute to both written and spoken elements of the course and its extra-curricular opportunities. A lively and enquiring mind, the capacity to be well organised and the motivation to achieve to the highest standards are all prerequisites of a successful Politics student.

Assessment is by 3 units examined at the end of Year 13:

Paper 1 -UK Politics (including study of Liberalism, Conservatism, Socialism).

Paper 2 -UK Government (including study of Anarchism).

Paper 3 -US Politics.

Many students have gone on to study Politics and related disciplines at prestigious centres of higher education including Oxford and Cambridge. The study of Politics, and the transferable skill set it nurtures, is relevant to many career areas.

Psychology



Psychology is the scientific study of the brain and behaviour. The specification offers students the chance to study psychological theories, research, terminology, statistics, interpretation, analysis and evaluation.

The course will cover areas such as the biological basis of behaviour (brain, nervous system, neuroscience, evolution, hormones, genetics and twin studies). Also, cognitive psychology (memory, learning and language acquisition), developmental psychology (child development), behaviourist psychology (Watson, Pavlov & Skinner), Freudian theory and the Humanistic approach. Students also learn about the influences of social situations on behaviour such as how obedience and conformity are shaped by our internal as well external situations.

In year two, students develop further analytical skills as they embark upon more complex 'options' such as forensic psychology, gender and schizophrenia. There is a heavy scientific element to all topics as well as inferential statistical analysis. Students will also develop a synoptic approach to the course by learning about the philosophical debates embedded within psychological theories and applications.

Pupils are assessed through three final exams; each 2 hours long. These include a mixture of multiple-choice, short answers, longer responses and extended writing questions. Pupils are also assessed on their scientific investigation skills.

Spanish



Spanish is a world language. There are over 500 million native Spanish speakers; more native speakers indeed than English. Spanish is expected to be the first language of 50% of the population of the USA within 50 years; at present, 1 in 8 Americans have Spanish as their first language. It is the official language of 21 countries. Spanish is a truly global language.

An English mother-tongue candidate with an additional language has an even more competitive edge in a competitive job market, a value often underestimated. A country's economy and trade can depend on the capacity to communicate in another language. Many companies are multi-national and almost all have dealings with other countries.

Language acquisition also gives access to a broad range of employment opportunities, as well as enjoying an excellent reputation amongst top universities. The Russell Group ranks Spanish as a preferred A Level and the ratio of applicants to places across modern languages is better for the applicant than any other subject area. This is especially true for Oxford and Cambridge applicants.

A Level Spanish will be a solid foundation for a degree course but will also provide a practical communication skill with broad appeal.

Graduates with language qualifications will earn, on average, 8-20% more than non-linguists in comparable jobs. Only medicine, dentistry and veterinary science graduates have a better employment ratio than modern foreign language graduates. Students will also have the opportunity to visit Spain as part of the course.

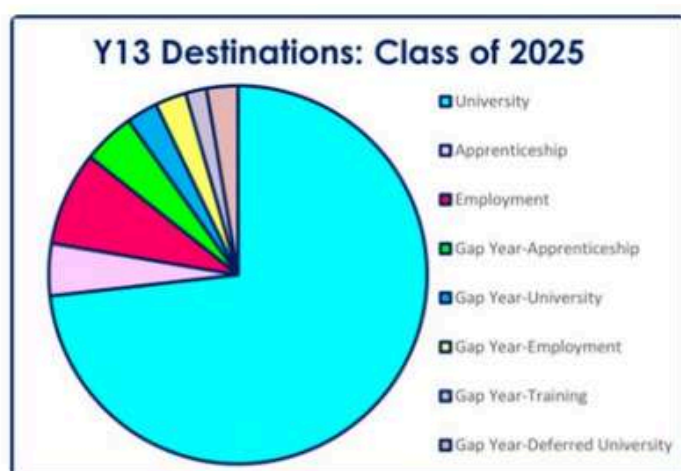
